Bird from Southwestern Public Health Region Tests Positive for West Nile Virus

Protect yourself from infected mosquitoes by using bug spray with DEET and cleaning up breeding sites

Public Health Ontario has reported that the first bird to test positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) in Ontario this year was found in the region served by Southwestern Public Health.

Birds testing positive for WNV are an indicator of the presence of WNV in the environment as birds can get the virus from the bite of an infected mosquito.

"The identification of a bird positive for West Nile Virus serves as our annual reminder to protect ourselves from mosquitoes," says Amy Pavletic, Manager of Environmental Health.

Pavletic's top tips for protecting yourself from the bite of an infected mosquito are using bug spray that has DEET when outdoors, wearing long-sleeved shirts and long pants, avoid being active outside at dawn and dusk, and cleaning up mosquito breeding sites by removing standing water at least once a week.

Neither Southwestern Public Health nor Public Health Ontario (PHO) directly collect dead birds for WNV testing. The Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative collects dead birds and performs the testing before providing the results to PHO. SWPH will begin its mosquito surveillance program for WNV next week, which will last throughout the summer.

Most people bitten by an infected mosquito do not show any symptoms. Others may have headache, body ache, fever, nausea, vomiting and rash. Fewer than 1% of people who are infected develop serious or lifethreatening symptoms such as meningitis or encephalitis.

How to prevent mosquito bites:

- Use bug spray with DEET when outdoors. Always read and follow the label.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts or jackets and long pants. Wear light colours wherever possible.
- Every week, remove or drain standing water from bird baths, flower pots, barrels, cans, pool covers, clogged drains, etc.
- Keep bushes and shrubs clear of overgrowth
- Properly maintain fish ponds to prevent or control mosquitoes

To Ed Ketchabaw, Elgin County Warden, and fellow members of Elgin County Council, <u>Re: Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Act & the Proposed 2023 Provincial</u>

We commend the government's initiative to address the housing crisis goal of building 1.5 million homes by 2031 while working to support Ontario's food production.

In Elgin County, Agribusiness is a vital contributor to the national economy, covering 130,000 hectares of land. Our thriving industry contributes a staggering \$558 million to the national GDP and creates 19.7% of jobs within the county. As such, it is an important sector that deserves continued support and investment.

We are asking Elgin County Council to provide our thoughts on the Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Act and the proposed 2023 Provincial Planning Statement (PPS) from the perspective of our rural and small urban communities to the Ontario Government to protect the future of the farming industry.

While agriculture is a crucial component of Elgin County's economy and culture, the proposed policy would permit up to three new residential lots to be created from a parcel of land that existed on January 1, 2023, subject to certain criteria. However, this could negatively affect other provincial and local interests, such as livestock farming, the availability of aggregate mineral resources, and the provision of municipal services.



The announcement of this legislation has sparked worries about the potential consequences of scattered residential development on farmland in Elgin County. The high prices of farmland are often driven by speculative investments that cause purchase prices to rise. The trend continues to make it increasingly difficult for future generations to acquire farmland as the cost of entry into farming becomes prohibitively expensive.

Merging urban and rural areas in Elgin County often increases tensions between residential neighbourhoods and agricultural land. These result in challenges for farmers, including difficulties in maintaining crop nutrition and protection, controlling wildlife, and carrying out necessary farm operations. These challenges usually lead to increased complaints to local municipalities regarding bylaws and regulations.

Bill 97 threatens both our food sovereignty and the agri-food sector. It undermines the importance of local food production and the need to buy locally to support our communities and ensure the sustainability of our food systems.

The proposed policy predicts farmland loss of approximately 510,000 acres in Ontario, with local estimates in Middlesex at 21,000 acres and Oxford estimating that 10% of farmland may qualify for the policy. The specific impact of this policy on farmland in Elgin County is still unknown and requires further investigation. To minimize the impact on agriculture, we can not further divide existing non-farm parcels within the agricultural area to provide additional rural housing opportunities.

Minimum Distance Separation (MDS) regulations impose strict guidelines on livestock operations to ensure they are located at a safe distance from residential areas and other sensitive land uses. While these regulations aim to protect public health and safety, they may also limit the growth and development of the industry. In Elgin, this legislation will make it virtually impossible for livestock operations to expand or establish



new operations when lots are severed to meet development requirements. This poses significant challenges for our food production industry in Elgin and hinders its future growth.

Elgin County has undergone an extensive Official Plan update process, including community engagement and significant amendments to the County's Official Plan. These legislative amendments will hinder the county's ability to address important rural land use matters crucial for our success and vitality.

Our organization has a strong partnership with the farmers in Elgin County, and we understand the significance of working together to support rural communities. With the current housing crisis, we must collaborate to find solutions. As Bill 97 proposes a new Provincial Planning Statement, we are eager to engage in discussions with the County of Elgin to ensure that the needs of the farming community are considered and addressed.

RE: Streamlining of Approvals under the Aggregate Resources Act and Supporting Policy

Greetings,

Ontario's aggregate industry plays a key role in our government's vision to Build Ontario, supporting vital development and jobs across the province. The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (the ministry) is proposing changes to <u>Ontario Regulation 244/97</u> under the *Aggregate Resources Act* to expand the list of changes that can be made to existing pit or quarry site plans without ministry approval, called self-filing changes (subject to conditions and eligibility), as well as seeking feedback on a new policy that provides direction for making changes to licences, permits and site plans that do require ministry approval.

The ministry is proposing to expand the list of small or routine site plan changes to an existing pit or quarry that can be self-filed, provided they satisfy detailed eligibility requirements and specified conditions. If approved, five additional site plan changes will be added to the list of self-filed amendments in the regulation. These are:

- Enabling recyclable aggregate material to be imported (concrete, asphalt, bricks, glass, or ceramics) to aggregate sites
- Adding or relocating entrances or exits to aggregate sites when the operator can provide proof of the relevant road authority approval for the change
- Adding, removing or changing portable processing equipment at aggregate sites (e.g., for crushing or screening aggregate material)
- Adding, removing or changing portable concrete or asphalt plants where required for public authority projects
- Adding, removing or changing above-ground fuel storage at aggregate sites

In addition, the ministry is proposing a new policy to clarify requirements including notification requirements when amendments are proposed to existing licenses, permits, or site plans that require ministry approval. The ministry is also outlining criteria or considerations to determine whether these changes are significant or not.

Amendment requests can include changes to site plans, conditions of a licence or permit, or any other information normally included on licences, permits, or wayside permits (e.g., name of operator, address, etc.). Amendment requests can vary in type and complexity ranging from small or administrative changes to significant changes to operations and rehabilitation. Significant changes may require consultation and notification.

We invite you to review the changes and offer comments.

Dear Premier Ford:

This letter will serve to advise that at a meeting of City of Quinte West Council held on May 31, 2023 Council passed the following resolution:

WHEREAS renovictions, a practice by which landlords evict tenants from their homes by claiming they will complete major renovations, demolish or convert the unit to commercial use, has had a significant adverse impact on Quinte West residents in the past few months;

AND WHEREAS renovictions have been and continue to be a contributing factor in perpetuating the Provincial housing crisis by making rental housing less affordable for Ontarians, particularly for seniors, individuals with disabilities, single-parent families, and students;

AND WHEREAS municipalities in Ontario have no ability to protect their residents from renovictions;

AND WHEREAS the Ontario Provincial Government has tabled legislation: Bill 97, the Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Act, 2023, to protect tenants from "bad faith" renovictions and to add more resources to the Landlord Tenant Board;

AND WHEREAS Quinte West City Council passed Motion 23-300 directing staff to prepare a resolution for Council's consideration on the matter;

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NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the City of Quinte West Council urges the Province to:

- Pass Bill 97, the Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Act, 2023;
- Add regulations requiring landlords to provide renovation updates when they evict tenants to ensure tenants are updated when they can exercise their right of return in order to protect tenants from "bad faith" renovictions;
- Consider an increase in fines for landlords who are found to have undertaken "bad faith" renovictions;

AND THAT Ontario municipalities be urged to voice their concerns regarding "bad faith" renovictions;

AND FURTHER THAT a copy of this resolution be sent to all Ontario municipalities, the Hon. Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the Hon. Steve Clerk, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing; Todd Smith, Bay of Quinte MPP, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), and the Eastern Ontario Wardens Caucus. **Carried**
